When we immigrated to the United States in 2012, we have no expectation of what our new life would be. A few years later, I have embraced my new American identity as I became a new American citizen in 2018. Yet,

I have never visited another country besides Vietnam, my old home country. As I am finishing my degree in mathematics, I realized that I want to participate in a study abroad program.
