A MESSAGE FROM THE EMERITI MENTOR PROGRAM CHAIR

The Chancellor's Scholarship Program is now in its 16th year and welcomes 40 mostly first-generation students to the program annually. The program is a mentorship and leadership development program emphasizing the following:

- Identifying strategies for career path development;
- Critical analysis of communication effectiveness;
- Creating and delivering effective oral presentations;
- Identifying campus resources and their opportunities for serving UC San Diego students.

Mentoring is a critical component of the program and is done through the Emeriti Mentor Program which engages emeriti faculty and staff in a one-on-one experience for the scholars. Scholars also experience peer mentoring with upper-division Chancellor's Scholars and ongoing leadership, communication and professional skill development. I encourage all mentors to talk to their emeriti colleagues about joining the mentor program.

I have been a mentor for 7 years and believe I have gotten more out of the program than I contributed. Getting to know mentees has been a great experience and I have maintained a relationship with most of my mentees throughout their years at UC San Diego. My first mentee now works on the campus and I have had the pleasure of following her early career development.

As the new Chair of the Emeriti Mentor Program, I hope to build on the success of my predecessors. Now that we are beyond the intensity of the COVID years, I would like to encourage more personal interaction among mentees and mentors. I also hope to identify additional financial support for the program and engage additional mentors from the emeriti faculty and staff.

I encourage mentees to enjoy their time at UC San Diego. Being an undergraduate student is a once in a lifetime experience. Please do well academically, and be sure to meet the requirements of your scholarship but also be sociable. Join a club, go to a sporting event, take advantage of the many non-academic activities available on the campus and in the community.




What are first year scholars saying about the CSP/EMP program?


I GAINED CONFIDENCE IN MY PUBLIC SPEAKING SKILLS


In particular, scholars have:


ISAIAH FRAUSTO SHARES HIS SUMMER STUDY ABROAD EXPERIENCE IN ITALY

WHY DID YOU WANT TO STUDY ABROAD?

I wanted to study abroad to maximize my college experience and take full advantage of the opportunities that the university has presented me with and has offered, especially as a Chancellor's Scholar. Additionally, it allowed me to partake in an experience I may never have the opportunity to do again. This is especially true when I have talked to mentors and people who have gone and gone through college/university and deeply regret their decision not to study abroad, let alone try to do so.

WHAT WAS THE BIGGEST THING YOU LEARNED ABOUT STUDYING ABROAD?

The process of applying for study abroad was a little bit different for me as I did not ask or receive any support throughout the process, which was of my own accord, but I do not recommend doing so. First I read the various study abroad programs UCSD offers and selected the best one that suited my needs and desires. I chose the UCEAP program as I would be a part of a program of only UC students from various UCs and earn UC credit for all my courses, which can easily be transferred to my transcript. Next, I searched for a location in which I wanted to study, which for me was Italy. Upon filtering my choices to this point there were around 5 options, 3 of which were for the summer term, which is the term I wanted to partake in. At this point, my options were all up to me and I decided to study abroad in Florence Italy for Summer 24. I made this decision and began the application process just 6 months before the program was set to start. By this time I was able to work and save up finances, attain a passport, purchase flights, schedule my health clearance, and get my desired courses approved. Which were all necessary and required for completion to partake in the summer. It is not as complex of a process as it may seem or people make it out to be, just be sure to be aware of all deadlines, read instructions and notes in detail, and truly do everything in your power to make sure your experience happens.



ON AN AVERAGE DAY LIVING IN FLORENCE ITALY

Living with my Italian homestay family, my days began at 7 AM with shared breakfast of toast, jam, and coffee. After getting ready in my Pinterest-worthy room, I'd catch the program-provided bus to the study center. Mornings started with Italian Food Culture class, followed by incredible €7 deli sandwiches and mandatory gelato for lunch. Afternoons mixed language classes with exploring Florence's shops and views. Evenings at home meant massive home-cooked Italian dinners at 8 PM with my host family. Dinner always included laughing and talking for hours with my homestay family. Some nights ended anywhere between 11 PM and 4 AM, either with gelato or dancing at discos. Weekends were spent traveling to new cities and countries, creating some of the best memories, meeting the best people, indulging in amazing food, and seeing things of beauty I thought I'd never see with my own eyes.

WHAT WAS THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE?

For me, the biggest challenge was not being able to share this experience with those I love and adore, like family and my closest friends. I truly wish they were able to see, eat, and experience the very things I did. I am grateful and filled with gratitude for my experiences, but I do truly wish they could have been there with me.

WHAT IS YOUR ADVICE FOR ANYONE THINKING ABOUT STUDYING ABROAD?

Put pressure on yourself to do it, make it happen, and do not push it off. You will not regret it!

Returning to UC San Diego this fall has given me time to reflect on the invaluable opportunities I've embraced so far. Each experience, from architectural design to community service, has not only enriched my studies but also clarified my path forward.

In the ARCH Club, I've worked on architectural projects alongside students who share a passion for design. This hands-on involvement has helped bring my academic focus to life, making speculative design and urban studies feel even more purposeful. Meanwhile, participating in the USP and RED programs has been instrumental in broadening my knowledge and skill set within my major. These programs have connected me with mentors and peers who are as driven and curious as I am, pushing me to think critically and creatively.

Outside of my academic pursuits, the Coptic Club has offered me a community centered on my Orthodox Christian faith. It's a space where we connect over shared beliefs, providing a supportive environment amidst the hustle of campus life.



The Scholars Society has introduced me to other scholarship recipients on campus, surrounding me with individuals who are motivated by their own unique backgrounds and ambitions—a source of constant inspiration.

One of my most rewarding experiences has been working as a studio coordinator at the Craft Center. My role spans both front-of-house and back-of-house responsibilities, from welcoming members and managing the craft lounge to working directly with clay, kiln loading, and glaze application. Being part of a community where creativity and learning intersect has been deeply fulfilling, teaching me patience, leadership, and technical skills that I know will serve me well in the future.

I've also had the privilege of volunteering at Humble Design, an organization that supports families transitioning out of homelessness. This opportunity came through my connection with my Emeriti Mentor, Dr. Mary Walshok, and has been incredibly meaningful. Transforming spaces to create comfortable, dignified homes has shown me the true power of thoughtful design—an impact that goes far beyond aesthetics.

All these experiences have been stepping stones toward my dream of a career in interior design and architecture. They've reinforced my belief that "hard work beats talent when talent fails to work hard," a mantra that motivates me to keep showing up and putting in the effort, even when balancing commitments gets challenging.

Indeed, managing my extracurriculars, academic responsibilities, and personal life has required resilience and strong time-management skills. Yet, these challenges have only strengthened my dedication, equipping me with essential skills that I carry into every project and interaction.

I can't overstate the value of gaining practical experience early in my college journey. These experiences have not only given me insight into my chosen field but also a foundation of real-world skills and meaningful connections. For anyone considering similar opportunities, my advice would be to dive in wholeheartedly; the lessons learned will stay with you and pave the way for whatever comes next!
