## VIRTUAL MEETING ETIQUETTE: DOS & DON'TS FOR A PROFESSIONAL WORK ENVIRONMENT

In today's evolving work landscape, where virtual meetings have become a significant part of our daily routines, it's crucial to maintain a level of professionalism that reflects our dedication and respect for our colleagues. Whether we are in a strictly virtual workplace, a hybrid setup, or still navigating in-person interactions, following proper virtual meeting etiquette ensures effective communication and a productive work environment. Here are some essential guidelines to help you excel in your virtual meetings.

### DO SET YOURSELF UP FOR SUCCESS WHEN HOSTING OR ATTENDING MEETINGS.

Because we have such a great number of hours taking meetings planning ahead will garner success. Do things such as keeping time zones in mind, sending out ample notice, and reminders so that you get maximum attendance when hosting and professional presence as an attendee.

#### DO MAKE YOURSELF SLIGHTLY UNCOMFORTABLE WHEN YOU ARE THE SPEAKER.

If you are the speaker during a meeting, take your energy level up high enough to where you feel just a little bit uncomfortable and then you'll be perfect! If you bring your energy level up it will translate over the internet better. You'll bring more attention to yourself which can in turn capture people's attention.

#### DON'T BE "DOIN' STUFF".

Doing things such as having side conversations with other people in the room, making big sweeping movements that are clearly not intended for the meeting and overly multitasking is rude and can detract from the meeting.

#### DO BEVERAGES THE RIGHT WAY.

Etiquette would dictate that it is absolutely acceptable to have a beverage while you are taking a virtual meeting just be mindful of a few things:

- If you are the speaker unless you were choking or getting hoarse mid-sentence, avoid taking a sip of a beverage while you're talking instead wait until it's someone else's turn to talk.
- A clear glass is best, this way people do not have to be distracted trying to guess what you're drinking.
- Coffee mugs are acceptable, just be mindful of any messaging on the cup that can be viewed as offensive.
- Try to avoid plastic disposable bottles. There's nothing more distracting than people having to watch you sucking sound and crushing a bottle as you turn your head up taking in that last drip of water.
- Resist the urge to snack and eat on camera even with the sound off it can be distracting.

#### DON'T DO ONLINE WHAT YOU WOULDN'T DO IN PERSON.

We have to treat virtual meetings no differently than a physical in-person meeting. So, our behavior should reflect the same. If you wouldn't use the bathroom in front of your colleagues while taking a meeting in-person then don't do it virtually. This just sets a bad precedence for professionalism and respect towards those who you're engaging with even if they can't see you.

#### DO CONNECT WITH THE AUDIENCE.

Because so many people declare that they look at whoever speaking during a video meeting it's important for the speaker to give the same impression and connect with the audience by appearing as though they're looking directly at them you do this by looking at the camera when you are speaking instead of looking at yourself or others who are on the screen.



#### DON'T MAKE PEOPLE WAIT TO START YOUR VIRTUAL MEETING.

Most people arrive on time which is good workplace behavior. Therefore, it is vital to honor those who are present as opposed to waiting for individuals who are late. People get annoyed having to wait for latecomers. So be respectful of your fellow colleagues and begin your meeting at the published time.

#### DO SET YOURSELF UP TO BE RESPECTED BY YOUR PEERS.

Because such a high percentage of people feel it's rude to turn your camera off, don't put yourself in a category of an individual who would not be respected by their coworkers. Having that camera off kind of gives off a voyeurism type of vibe and can even feel creepy when you are speaking up yet are unseen. Turning your camera on tells the others that you are present and engaged in the meeting and the discussion at hand.

It's annoying, distracting, and downright rude to allow noise from your personal environment to seep into a virtual meeting. It's similar to standing outside of a conference room with the door open and carrying on a loud conversation. Close the door.

In conclusion, following these simple dos and don'ts will help ensure that virtual meetings are productive, respectful, and efficient. Maintaining a high standard of virtual meeting etiquette not only reflects well on you as a professional but also contributes to a more effective and collaborative work environment. By adhering to these guidelines, we can all enjoy smoother, more engaging, and more productive virtual interactions.

#### WORKING ALONGSIDE THE CHANCELLOR'S SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The partnership between the Center for Student Involvement (CSI) and the Chancellor's Scholars Program (CSP) runs deep. I've only been in this particular role for two years now but in this time I've learned that CSI at one point hosted all the weekly CSP meetings. Due to staff capacity and availability overtime, we've had to scale down our offerings. Last academic year, I facilitated a total of four workshops to both the first and second year cohorts. This academic year, I've hosted three presentations that were much more intentional to the specific cohorts and tied well with the activities and events that followed. For instance, during Fall quarter, I was the first to present for CSP's weekly meeting series and although the topic was "Effective Communication" I placed a strong emphasis on introductions and breaking the ice as this was the first time many of these students were meeting each other. We spent time focusing on being confident and authentic with our stories and finding connections with one another. During the Winter quarter, I did a presentation on "Elevator Pitches" where the Advanced Scholars learned, practiced, and prepared for an upcoming networking event with the Emeriti faculty. Finally, I had one last presentation with the first year cohort where I gave them tips and tricks on how to nail a PowerPoint presentation. I also helped normalize all the emotions that come with public speaking and working in a group. Ultimately, I've had the pleasure to meet these awesome student scholars and plan closely with the CS Program Coordinator, Jennifer Homrich, to ensure we were providing the most intentional support to these students.

#### ADVICE FOR OTHER SCHOLARS CURRENTLY STRUGGLING TO FIND LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

As a former UCSD student and scholar, I understand first-hand that there are so many opportunities and events happening all the time, it can be difficult to keep up with and know who is offering what and when. Although this can be a little overwhelming, I encourage and advise you all to lean into the excitement and joys of being a college student. This is your time to explore your options. I say take advantage of your time here and go to everything you can. If you're unsure about something, ask someone. Find your community, seek mentors, and don't be afraid to attend an event on your own. You never know who you're going to meet or what you're going to learn. Like many people say "College is the best time of

your life" but it's ultimately your time and your choice to seek and find the opportunities that align with your values and interests. # Study (Research) Abroad Spotlight

#### WHY DID YOU WANT TO STUDY ABROAD?

For my last year, I was thinking about either taking math graduate courses to improve my knowledge or do a study abroad program as I have never done that before. I decided to choose a study abroad program instead, and the programs that I was researching are all through UCEAP (UC Education Abroad Program). Through UCEAP, there is less difficulty for seniors to study abroad compared to other available programs because the senior residency requirement can be waived with UCEAP but not guaranteed for other programs. I then settled for programs in Japan as I am interested in the academic and cultural opportunities there. With that, I choose UCEAP's Engineering and Science program as it is the only year-long program in Japan that is research based.

#### WHAT WAS THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE?

I think the biggest challenge for me is the language barrier that I have here in Japan. Learning Japanese in Tohoku University has been a big help in helping me live my day to day life here, but with making Japanese friends and communicating with other members of my lab, it has been a difficult time trying to know them better. Not knowing the language well can set you back quite a bit especially in social situations. If I am scared to talk to a new person, then that person will not feel the need to talk to me, which continues the awkward cycle. Navigating Japanese social customs is definitely not an easy feat for me, especially when I have not visited Japan or studied Japanese formally.

#### WHAT IS YOUR ADVICE FOR ANYONE THINKING ABOUT STUDYING ABROAD?

If you are able to fit a study abroad program into your plans, then I highly recommend you to pursue the program that you like. Make sure that you choose the study abroad program that fits your goals and situation! For financial aid, there are many scholarships out there that can help you fund your study abroad program. I was fortunate enough to receive both the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship and UCSD Emeriti Association's International Study Scholarship, which combined with my UCSD financial aid package, I am able to go without taking out more loans. For Japan specific programs, the host university can also consider you for the JASSO Scholarship, which is a monthly stipend of ¥80,000 yen per month, which also can help with your living expenses in Japan.



#### HOW DID THE SCHOLARSHIP POSITIVELY IMPACT YOUR EXPERIENCE?

I am very thankful for the International Study Scholarship that was awarded by Dr. Suresh Subramani and Dr. Feroza Ardeshir, as it has eased my biggest worry about partaking in a study abroad program, especially the need for my parents' financial support. Not worrying much about the finances has allowed me to enjoy my studies and focus on my research project in my program. My living experience in Japan has also improved as well, and I am able to venture out and travel around Japan quite a bit with my program friends. I have been able to share some of my trips with Dr. Subramani and Dr. Ardeshir via email, and they are very happy to hear about my experience so far!

### **MENTOR SPOTLIGHT**

#### **Dr. Timothy Dresselhaus**

Dr. Timothy Dresselhaus is a graduate of UC San Diego / Revelle College (History), UC San Francisco School of Medicine (MD), and the UC San Diego Internal Medicine Residency Program. He served as Chief, Primary Care Service at VA San Diego Healthcare System and Clinical Professor, UC San Diego until his retirement in 2022. Dr. Dresselhaus has authored or co-authored thirty-five research articles spanning quality measurement, quality improvement, clinician time studies, models of primary care delivery, patient safety and, most recently, clinician burnout. He has served as the Director, UCSD Medicine 401 Clerkship and as Associate Director, UCSD Internal Medicine Residency.



#### What made you join the Emeriti Mentor Program?

I was interested in sustaining my involvement in the campus life of UCSD and was invited to consider the Emeriti Mentor Program by one of its members, Dr. Roger Spragg, who was a mentor to me at the very outset of my UCSD faculty career.

## CSP/EMP ASSISTANT COORDINATOR SPOTLIGHT

#### **DIRECTING A DIFFERENCE**

"If you take care of things, they last." While I first heard these words from my grandmother when referring to her 60-year-old baking pans that remained in pristine condition, they have since come to resonate with me deeply. They can be applied to many facets of life, from physical items, ideas, and what I've experienced in the UCSD Chancellor's Scholars Program. In my experience working with a long-standing scholarship program, I notice how much care the program has received to make it what it is today, whether that be monthly board meetings, the help of UCSD Emeriti Mentors, or simply hosting game nights for stressed-out students, this program is greatly cared for. Being involved in this program from both the perspective of a student and a staff member has motivated me to actively support and guide similar initiatives aimed at mentoring others.

My CSP family cared for my success and gave me peace of mind that has kept me moving forward throughout my time on campus.

While going through the program myself as a student, I also worked behind the scenes as a student assistant for the UCSD staff that cares for it. The RRC Director and CSP/EMP Program Coordinator strongly believe in the organization's values and are passionate about helping students succeed. Seeing all the planning and details that go into maintaining and improving the program daily is eye-opening, to say the least, but something I felt I could be good at, too. For the first two years of working with CSP, I mostly spent my hours drafting marketing materials, helping run events, and processing information on the backend. While this allowed me to have a small role in the program, at the end of 2023, I was promoted to Assistant Program Coordinator for the CSP/EMP Program. Now, I work more directly in planning and assisting the program from little details to big events.

In my new role, I get to be a leader, helping students who are in similar standings as I am. Partially encompassing my duties in the CSP, I actively research new ideas and topics for the program, create media for emails, websites, and social media platforms, and am on track to solo-run weekly meetings for a room of 20+ of my peers. I enjoy the creative, strategic, and impactful work this entails, and I hope to continue with similar endeavors.

Without the help of CSP, I would not have been able to afford college, let alone attend one of the top universities in the world. The scholarship has provided me funds for school and a roadmap for navigating the college experience. Through other means, CSP has illuminated my interest in program directing. I discovered that I greatly enjoy planning and organizing large scale events, networking, meeting with some of UCSD's top faculty members, and creating different types of marketing media. Most importantly, my experience as an active CSP community member gave me a deep appreciation for its values and future success. I care for the programs mission and hope to be able to provide the same care to other programs aimed toward student success.


academically talented group of scholars, we encourage you to consider this
